On August 28, 1963, U. S. District Judge J. ROBERT ELLIOTT issued a ruling concerning the desegregation of public schools in Dougherty County, Georgia. This ruling was based on a hearing held in Albany on August 22, 1963, and the ruling affirmed the Dougherty County Board of Education plan for desegregation to be effected September, 1964. This plan provides for desegregation of the first grade for the 1964 - 1965 school term and thereafter a step by step desegregation of one additional grade each year.

The meeting was addressed by [redacted] SLATER KING, Acting President of the Albany Movement and a candidate for Mayor of Albany, Georgia and [redacted]

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[redacted] advised that a meeting of the Albany Movement was held the evening of September 23, 1963, at the Beulah Baptist Church at which meeting 200 persons were in attendance. The meeting was addressed by SLATER KING and SAMUEL BENJAMIN WELLS who encouraged a boycott of "big money Negroes" in Albany who did not support the efforts of the Albany Movement.

They discussed the confinement in the Albany City Jail of the peace walkers engaged in the Quebec-
Quantanamo Walk for Peace sponsored by the Committee for Non-Violent Action.

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[REDACTED] advised that on January 9, 1964, at about 8:15 a.m. six members of the Committee for Non-Violent Action gathered in front of City Hall, Albany, Georgia, and commenced walking in circles. They were protesting convictions of nine members of that group in Recorder's Court, Albany, Georgia, on January 8, 1964. The group continued their protest until 11:35 a.m. at which time they were ordered to disperse by [REDACTED] Albany, Georgia Police Department. They refused and were placed under arrest. They were charged with failure to obey the orders of an officer.

III. STATUS OF PENDING INTEGRATION SUITS

"The Columbus Ledger", a Columbus, Georgia daily newspaper, in its issue of January 14, 1964, set forth an article which indicated that a hearing on a suit seeking enrollment of five Negro children in white schools of Muscogee County, Georgia, was filed January 13, 1964, in U. S. District Court by three attorneys of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The suit asked for preliminary and permanent injunctions to force the Muscogee County Board of Education to cease operating a dual school system in Muscogee County based wholly on the race and color of children attending schools in that county. No date has been set for the hearing by Judge J. ROBERT ELLIOT, who will hear the case. The plaintiffs also asked as an alternative that the defendants present a complete plan within a period of time to be determined by the court for the reorganization of the entire Muscogee County School System into a unitary non-racial system.

On January 23, 1964, a similar meeting was held at the invitation of [REDACTED] which included military personnel and civilians of the Negro race. They also discussed the names of possible members to serve on the Interracial Committee.

[REDACTED] advised that on the evening of January 28, 1964, a meeting of the Albany Movement was held at the Union Baptist Church, approximately two hundred persons attending the meeting. The speaker was FRED L. SHUTTLEWORTH, described as integration leader from Birmingham, Alabama, who talked about the racial situation in Birmingham. SHUTTLEWORTH also criticized Chief of Police, LAURIE PRITCHETT, and described him as a "modern day American dictator, who has the public fooled".

B. Albany, Georgia

The "Atlanta Constitution" in its issue of March 12, 1964, set forth an article which indicated that the U. S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals will hear arguments on whether the grade-a-year school desegregation plan of Dougherty County which is scheduled to begin in September will provide sufficient speed.

There has been no change in Category II subsequent to Atlanta memorandum dated November 15, 1963.

III. STATUS OF PENDING INTEGRATION SUITS

The "Atlanta Constitution" in its issue of February 18, 1964, set forth an article which indicated that U. S. District Judge J. ROBERT ELLIOTT postponed indefinitely a hearing on an injunction by Negro attorneys seeking to enjoin the Muscogee County school district from operation of a dual school system.

The "Atlanta Constitution" in its issue of February 27, 1964, set forth an article which indicated that an attorney for Negro parents in Macon, Georgia, stated that objections will be filed to a gradual desegregation proposal by the Bibb County School Board. This plan turned in by the school board is a nine-year plan for desegregation. This was turned in after U. S. District Judge W. A. BOOTLE ordered submission of a plan following a suit by Negroes last August.

IV. GENERAL RACIAL CONDITIONS

A. TROUBLE SPOTS

1. Albany, Georgia

[REDACTED] advised that a meeting of the Albany Movement was held on the evening of February 17, 1962, at the Arcadia Baptist Church. Approximately 125 persons attended. CHARLES SHERROD, Field Secretary for the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, talked to the group concerning

voter registration activities. ELZA JACKSON told the group she was being tried for perjury on February 24, 1964, and advocated a demonstration for February 22, 1964. SLATER KING, Acting President of the Albany Movement, addressed the group, denouncing the death of a Negro who was killed by Albany police officers.

[REDACTED] 11th INTC Group, Albany, Georgia, advised on April 9, 1964, that [REDACTED] of the Marine Corps Supply Center, Albany, Georgia, who has been active in forming a bi-racial committee in the Albany area, was the recipient of a pamphlet captioned "Commissars in the USA by THURMAN SENEING." This pamphlet indicated that a report titled "Equality of Treatment and Opportunity for Negro Personnel Stationed Within the United States" would attempt to create a commissar system in the American Armed Forces and make civilian communities in the United States subject to the political orders of military base commanders. The report allegedly urges the end of all types of segregation in military bases, including the hiring of Negro hostesses instead of white hostesses and not allowing girls who believe in segregation on bases for social functions.

IV. GENERAL RACIAL CONDITIONS

A. Trouble Spots.

1. Albany, Georgia

[REDACTED] advised on April 20 and April 22, 1964, that a meeting of the Albany Movement was held on the evening of April 20 1964, at the Shiloh Baptist Church, Albany, Georgia. Approximately four hundred persons attended. SLATER KING, President of the Albany Movement, spoke, and protested the killing by gunshot of a fifteen year old Negro male by an officer of the Albany, Georgia Police Department. This shooting was made at the scene of a burglary. KING requested persons attending the meeting to appear at a meeting of the City Commission at City Hall on the evening of April 21, 1964, for the purpose of protesting the killing of Negroes by Albany police officers.

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On the evening of April 21, 1964, approximately fifty Negroes appeared at the City Hall in Albany, Georgia, to attend a meeting of the City Commission. The scheduled meeting had been postponed earlier and the Negroes left without incident.

"The Atlanta Constitution", in its issue of April 29, 1964, set forth an article which stated that a delegation of Negroes appeared before the Albany City Council on April 28, 1964, to protest the senseless

killings of Negroes by the Albany Police Department. The article set forth that the delegation was headed by SLATER KING, and they demanded a halt to police brutality, and an investigation into the slayings. They also demanded that the City Council hire Negroes as policemen to help ease conditions.

"The Albany Herald", an Albany, Georgia, daily newspaper, in its issue of April 29, 1964, set forth an article which indicated that Albany Mayor, JAMES V. DAVIS, rejected charges that Albany police had indulged in senseless killings of Negroes. Mayor DAVIS indicated that the individuals killed were killed in connection with their commission of crimes.
