

I have the honor to report that this office has been advised by the Military Intelligence, the Department of Justice, the Consul at Guaymas, and the Consul at Nogales, of the impending visit of Jack Johnson, the American Negro Prize Fighter, who it seems is fugitive from justice in the United States.

Johnson is visiting the district under the auspices of José Cantu, the brother of Governor Cantu, and they expect to arrange exhibition and actual boxing bouts at Mexicali and Tijuana.

The Department of Justice hopes to get Jack over the Line and place him under arrest.

I have assured the local representative of the Department of Justice of my desire to aid him as far as possible in securing the custody of Mr. Jack.

Referring to my despatch No.319 dated March 22, 1920, I have the honor to report that Mr. Yost, Consul at Guaymas, sent me the following memorandum under date of March 21, 1920:

Jack Johnson arrived at Guaymas this evening from Mazatlan. He informed me that he expected to give an exhibition on Tuesday night, the 23rd. Evidently he does not expect to start for the Rio Colorado until after that date. He also said that he was bound for Tia Juana where it is thought a match will be arranged.

*APR 2 1920 Filed*

Gustavo Dato, brother-in-law of Governor Cantú, has been in Guaymas for several days, presumably to meet Jack, although he gave another excuse. He tried to get the American motor boat Anita D. to take the party to the Rio Colorado, alleging that he was trying to buy her for use in the fish packing business.

I will keep you informed as to Jack's movements.

I am informed that Jack Johnson's manager arrived last night on the train from Guaymas and that he said Johnson intended to come to Nogales and give himself up. I asked Vice Consul Doherty to look into this report and to spend this afternoon on that and on another matter interesting to the Department of Justice and the Treasury Department.

Vice Consul Doherty had a conversation with the man who saw Jack Johnson's manager on the Guaymas train. Said man is an agent of the Department of Justice. Johnson's manager told him that the pugilist had only \$2000 left, that he intended to give an exhibition in Guaymas and secure a match in Tia Juana, from which he hoped to get money enough to keep his wife while he was serving in jail the sentence he expected to receive for evading military service.

SIR:

I have the honor to report that I received a telegram in code Saturday from the American Consul at Guaymas, who transmitted it for the American Consul at Mazatlan. The said telegram may be paraphrased as follows:

Guaymas, Mar. 20, 4 P., 1920: American Consul:-- Mr. Chapman, Consul at Mazatlan, telegraphed me to-day to the effect that Jack Johnson was leaving there to-day in company of Governor Cantu's brother for Guaymas and that at Guaymas they would take the boat belonging to the Governor (Cantu) for the mouth of the Colorado river,-- presumably on an exploring trip. From there they will go to Mexicali and thence to Tia Juana, whence Johnson expects to go to the United States, within a period of five weeks. The Consul at Mazatlan requests that you will notify the Department of State, the American Consul at Mexicali, and the local immigration authorities.

With reference to the Department's telegram No. 50, of February 13, 5 P. M., in regard to the return of the pugilist Jack (or John A.) Johnson and his wife to the United States, I have the honor to report that emergency passports were issued to them by the Embassy on March fourth, for return to the United States, and that they left this city on or about March eighth for Manzanillo on the west coast, enroute to the United States.

In view of the fact that Johnson could not tell when he left here the date on which he would sail from Manzanillo, or the port at which he would enter the United States, I instructed the American Consul at Manzanillo to keep the Embassy informed in the matter, and subsequently, when notified by that Consul that Johnson was sailing on


March thirteenth enroute to Mazatlan and the Lower California frontier




