Dear Governor Daniel:

I am sorry to see that your September twenty-fourth tele-gram wholly misses the point in respect to the mission of Federal soldiers in Little Rock. They are not there to enforce desegregation; they are there to support our Federal Court System; to uphold the law which the State has blocked and which the local community has been unable to uphold lacking State support.

No one is more determined than I am to get Federal troops out of Little Rock at the earliest date consistent with respect for the law. To remove them before then, however, would be to acquiesce in anarchy and, ultimately, the dissolution of the Federal Union.

First, I want to say that I am a Southerner, born and bred in Atlanta, Georgia, and I feel that I have the right to criticize my fellow-Southerners. Our Church people here thoroughly approve of what the President has done about the situation in Arkansas, although a few of them believe it would have been easier if we had started with the Elementary or lower grades in the integration of schools. The little ones are more adaptable and by the time they reached the High Schools, would be taking it in their stride!

Separate schools for the two races are more expensive to keep going. We have no rebels in the South any more, but quite a bit of rabble, all colors! And how they love a big fight- just like the Irish! However, that does not excuse our Governors and Congressmen who seem to fear the mobs so much that they are even willing to block progress in the South by keeping about half of the population uneducated and back-woodsy. If they would only see reason and realize that our President has only the good of the whole Country at heart in his endeavor to create a fair share of learning in the Southern States, so that we may keep pace with the rest of the United States, everyone here would be so happy!

Dear President Eisenhower:

We regret very much the conditions which have occasioned your calling out Federal Troops to handle the situation in Little Rock, Arkansas, but we wholeheartedly support your actions.

We are convinced that your patience and endurance and consideration have been all that anyone could expect of you. We are further convinced that your actions in sending Federal Troops was the only thing that could be done at this time to protect law and order against mob rule. As the nation's Chief Executive, you have acted in the interest of democracy, freedom, security, law and order.

In 1955 and 1956 I visited Russia, Roumania, Hungary and Yugoslavia. In these countries time and time again I was questioned regarding conditions in the United States that seemed to be contrary to the democratic philosophy and process. My answer was that these things exist because in America we believe in the freedom of the individual, and our government is patient with those who sometimes do not understand the true philosophy of our way of life. And because we do not believe in concentration camps, it seems at times, that our government is indifferent to



those who in the name of traditions act contrary to the established laws of our land. But our nation is committed to justice and to the principles of the Federal Constitution, and if at any time those who violate the high principles of our government make an attempt to establish their policies as the law of the land, the Federal Government will put an end to such, and all of the force and authority of the republic will protect and sustain the laws of the land.

This courageous act of yours will go down in history as one of the truly great decisions among the presidents of the United States, for you have shown that America believes in law and order, and that the whole nation basically, is committed to the same. You have the support of five million members of the National Baptist Convention and of every true American citizen throughout this nation.

May God bless and sustain your efforts as you lead this nation forward in the name of truth, justice and peace.

Dear Mr. President:

Thank you for your letter in reply to my telegram of September 30 urging you to withdraw Federal troops from Little Rock, Arkansas.

One of the great tragedies of the Supreme Court school desegregation decision, the resulting agitation and pressures of outsiders for racial intergration, and now the occupation of Little Rock by Federal troops is the destruction of friendly relations between Negro and White in the South, and the engendering of hatred and intolerance. The great gains of both races in recent years are lost or endangered, and can never be regained as long as Federal troops are used to enforce intergration on the South.

I again urge you to withdraw the troops as a first step toward restoring the principle of States Right, and rebuilding the confidence and goodwill between the two races so essential to the well-being of both.

Better schools and better economic conditions are among the chief needs of the South. This is particularly true as regards the Negro. If those now vying for the Negro vote really want to help the Negro, they should assist the South in providing these needs.
