(ADVANCE) NEW YORK, N.Y., AUG. 13 - The American Civil Liberties Union announced today its support of the August 28 Washington, D. C. civil rights demonstration "as an historic occasion in which the combined voices of thousands of Americans will be heard on the most vital question facing our nation."

The civil liberties organization said the Washington assembly "was an exercise of the First Amendment's right of assembly and the right to petition the government for redress of grievances." The statement was issued by the Executive Committee of the ACLU Board of Directors.

"As an organization dedicated to furthering the expression of First Amendment rights and equally concerned with eliminating the evil of racial discrimination from American life, the American Civil Liberties Union supports the Washington civil rights demonstration. ... We hope and urge that all members of the ACLU who are able will support the demonstration and participate in this expression of opinion on what civil rights legislation the Congress should pass."

The ACLU said the August 28 meeting "is ^{in the} finest American tradition of the right of protest."

Dear Sir:

On Thursday, June 13, 1963 between 1:30 and 3:15 p.m., a meeting was held by several labor leaders in the office of Mr. A. Philip Randolph, 217 West 125th St., Manhattan. As a result of this meeting, it was decided by the sponsors to call a meeting of Negro leaders to determine the advisability of changing the date of the proposed March to Washington from October to August of this year.

The original plans for this March called for the joint participation of labor groups to protest the lack of jobs for Negroes. However, in view of the murder of Medgar Evers, N.A.A.C.P. Field Secretary in Mississippi, and the pending civil rights legislation, coupled with racial incidents that have occurred in the United States, the sponsors feel that the March should include all of the groups currently engaged in Civil Rights demonstrations.

This matter will receive continued attention and new developments will be reported as they occur.

Dear Mr. Randolph:

Thank you very much for your letter of May 24, 1963, advising of the proposed Emancipation March to Washington for Jobs and the request to hold a program at the Lincoln Memorial on October 5. We understand that the organizations taking part in the march would include the Negro American Labor Council, Southern Christian Leadership Conference, Congress of Racial Equality and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

We realize fully the keen interest on the part of yourself and your associates in the need for greater employment opportunities for Negroes. The Federal Government is also keenly interested in fair employment opportunities for persons of all races.

A request for permission to march on Pennsylvania Avenue would have to be discussed with the Metropolitan Police Department since the jurisdiction over Pennsylvania Avenue is vested in the Commissioners of the District of Columbia. We suggest that you apply to Deputy Chief Howard Covell of the Metropolitan Police Department for permission to use Pennsylvania Avenue for this purpose.

However, any march to the Memorial would, in addition, involve traveling over Constitution Avenue or other streets under the jurisdiction of this Department as part of the National Capitol Region of the National Park Service. We would be pleased to consider the issuance to the Council of a permit to use these streets along with our consideration of the issuance of a permit for the use of the Lincoln Memorial.

Before we can grant a permit, which is authorized by our Departmental Regulations (see 26 CFR 3.21), we would like to have from

you more detailed information concerning the approximate time the proposed march would take place. As you no doubt are aware, many tourists visit the Lincoln Memorial as one of the highlights of their visit to the Nation's Capitol. In addition, the road around the Memorial is an important thoroughfare for traffic which moves between the District of Columbia and Virginia over the Memorial Bridge. In these circumstances, it would be important to us to be able to arrange any accommodation of your march to and program at the Memorial at a time and in a manner which would cause the least interference with the normal flow of traffic and visitation by the public. We would have great difficulty, for example, in re-routing or otherwise altering the usual traffic pattern in the Memorial area during the early morning or late afternoon work hours. While October 5 falls on a Saturday, when there is less traffic than on week days, there is heavy traffic nonetheless because of the business places that are open. And the weekend days draw more sightseers to Washington at that time of year than week days.

We recognize that the Lincoln Memorial has a greater symbolic significance for the Council than other areas which might be available for its program. Consequently, we merely call to your attention that the Sylvan Theatre on the Washington Monument grounds has been specifically designed for large group meetings and would be able to accommodate easily a crowd of up to 100,000 persons.

Should you or representatives of your Council wish to meet on this matter, representatives of this Department would be available at your convenience.

MEMORANDUM

This information is based on a private conversation with Walter Fauntroy.

The leadership of the major Negro organizations are putting together an office in Washington to serve as the focal point for lobbying and public relations in the upcoming Civil Rights battle on the Hill. It is hoped that the office will come into being in the next two weeks and that it will be staffed by experts on Congressional relations with a Negro leader as the figure-head who will be the "front-man". The leaders of the NAACP, CORE and SCLC are in constant touch on this matter.

The announcement in New York by Rev. George Lawrence that there will be a 300,000 man demonstration in Washington on August 28 came as a surprise to the leadership group and apparently Rev. Lawrence "will say no more for a while". It is felt that the major emphasis should be put on the use of all powers of political persuasion saving the major demonstration as the court of last resort. The leadership indicates that there is no reluctance to conduct whatever demonstration in Washington merely for the sake of the demonstration could have a negative effect on the Congress during the intense summer months on the legislation.

There is one major segment that is not in agreement. A. Phillip Randolph and his New York organization, representing a large sector, feel that the demonstration should be scheduled, organized and held. While efforts are to be made to bring them into the fold it is not at all certain that this can be done.

The leadership realized that if the intent of the Washington office of negotiation and centralization of authority can be realized, and if they can get the right people working on it, that it would have a valuable effect.

MEMORANDUM

Re: The meeting held at the Police Dept.

This is a summary outline of the meeting held at the Police Dept. Thursday morning to discuss plans for the August 28 Civil Rights demonstration:

The following were present: Chief Murray, Deputy Covell, Deputy Wallrodt, Deputy Johnson, Deputy Winters, Deputy Layton, Inspector Wright, Mr. Caldwell - Justice Dept, Mr. Sutton Jett, - National Park Service, Chief Murdock - Park Police, Paul Rilling - Human Relations Counsel, Rev. Walter E. Fauntroy, Baynard Rustin, - Deputy Director of the March, Sterling Tucker, E. Franklin Jackson, Bishop Smallwood Williams, Julius Hobson, Joseph Beavers.

The meeting was tape recorded and transcripts will be delivered to all participants.

Mr. Rustin served as the spokesman for the group. He emphasized that the only individuals authorized to speak for the leadership group are direct representatives of that group (Roy Wilkins, Martin L. King, James Farmer, John Lewis, Whitney Young and A. Phillip Randolph) and that they would meet Friday in New York to discuss all plans and make decisions. Today's meeting was for purposes of exchange of information with the responsible officials in Washington.

Deputy Chief Howard Covell ran the meeting.

Rustin indicated that there would be four areas of activity on August 28 and that all participants would be urged to arrive and leave on that day.

1. Demonstrations on jobs and unemployment at the White House.
2. March down Penna. Ave. to Lincoln Memorial.
3. Mass meeting at Lincoln Memorial.
4. Lobbying in a "variety of ways".

Rustin indicated that the 300,000 figure being used was not from the "leadership": and that better estimates were 100,000 or over.

Rustin layed out the following plan:

Delegations would go to visit members of Congress by pre-arrangement and Congressmen would be invited to come to areas where State Delegations would congregate, mainly churches, to address the delegations.

The time schedule planned is:

10 - 12 noon lobbying

12 noon on - White House demonstrations followed by march and mass meeting at Lincoln Memorial.

Mr. Rustin indicated that the theme of the march being recommended was "A tribute to Medgar Evers and all the White and Negro individuals who had been killed in the Civil Rights Struggle". This is to give the march a solemn tone and discourage hyper-activity. Instead of bands, groups of choruses singing "We Shall Overcome" will be in the parade.

Rustin indicated that historically violence in Negro demonstrations came from outside agitators or police brutality.

Guardians - Members of the NY Police force who are Negroes have an organization called the Guardians. They will be used ~~as~~ the internal security force for the Negro leadership in the demonstration and will number in excess of 1,000. They will have arm bands with MARSHALL on them and while they will have no police authority in Washington, they will be used to maintain order. They will conduct a school on four Thursday evenings in N. Y. to train bus and train Captains as additional control personnel. Identification will be provided for all people in the march to distinguish them from outside groups.

The organized group plans to advise officials of all movements in advance to insure adequate planning.

Rustin indicated that white church groups had requested approval to participate by having in excess of 2,000 Protestant, Jewish and Catholic ministers surround the Capitol in prayer during the day.

Rustin indicated that they would arrange for ambulances, first aid stations, doctors and nurses and water stations to be provided for emergency use and might need help in these areas.

Julius Hobson indicated that the use of bull horns for crowd control

had been most helpful in the June 14 demonstration. Hobson requested use of the horns. Chief Murray indicated they would be glad to make them available but that they only had four or five and the Park Service had an additional three or four. Paul Rilling indicated he would look into the matter.

Rustin indicated that they will plan to organize the arrival of all busses, trains and planes to provide maximum coordination and organization and encourage everyone to leave that same night. He indicated that there might be motor-cades into the city from Boston to North Carolina.

At this point, Rustin addressed himself to the "Representative of the Justice Department" and said that they must be "vigilant" and see to it that this was an orderly affair all the way along the route particularly in states where Negroes in busses might have problems. Rustin indicated that such actions as bus burnings or other actions that had happened in the past could change the entire tenor of the whole demonstration. He said they would furnish a memorandum of all major routes that the busses will be taking.

Mr. Caldwell, in reply, indicated that he did not represent the FBI but was the personal representative of Burke Marshall and that Justice cannot take preventative action and that policing of busses was impossible. Bishop Williams indicated that the FBI should be alerted and make investigations about possible plots to harm demonstrators en route to Washington. Rustin continued that when the President goes to NYC plans are made to ensure that he is not harmed and that similar ^{NYC} should be taken. Rustin indicated that the leadership wanted indications that "routes will be watched".

Mr. Caldwell indicated that the President is protected by Secret Service by law and the function of crime prevention is in local hands and not the Justice Dept. He said they should feel free to approach other local officials.

Rustin indicated that he felt this portion of the conversation should not continue.

Julius Hobson indicated that a report in the papers said that Lincoln Rockwell planned to have over 10,000 men in counter demonstration and that the police should be aware of this.

Chief Winters asked about the participation of children and was told that participants were being told that none under 17 should come although some children might come with their parents. Winters indicated that the Youth Aid Division would be available to assist at the Lincoln Memorial mass meeting.

Inspector Wright urged staggering of bus arrivals and prior notification of routes for maximum escorts and traffic control. It was also emphasized that it would be helpful to have distinctive markers on busses arriving.

Sterling Tucker indicated that not all the marchers would be Negro and that the demonstration was planned to be representative of "Americana".

There was general agreement that the demonstration of June 14 was complete, peaceful and successful and that plans for this one would follow along those lines.

The question of police dogs was raised as a "psychological factor". Chief Murray indicated that there would be dogs assuming there was no trouble.

It was requested that Lt. Davis of Precinct #2 be assigned as liason officer with the Coordinating group. The group indicated that one of the Washington representatives of the National organizations would be selected as major liason as soon as possible.

The entire emphasis of the ninety minute meeting was to do everything possible to make the planned demonstration as well organized and peaceful as possible with all groups working together toward the common goal.



Dear Senator Byrd:

It is my fervent wish that you and Senator Robertson will exercise leadership to the Virginians to help them adopt a more responsible attitude toward the education of all of the residents of Prince Edwards, Virginia. It is with the deepest shame that I read editorials and magazine articles calling attention to the primitive conditions in this County.

There is a never a meeting I attend that this shameful condition does not come up during the course of conversation and it is with great embarrassment that I learn that women of good will all over the United States are concerned and working toward a remedy of this condition. As a Virginian of many generations I urge that you gentlemen furnish the leadership to change this deplorable condition. I doubt if any history book written in the future will not devote a chapter to the fact that the State of Virginia, almost ten years after the Supreme Court decision on segregation, had failed to provide public education for five years in Prince Edward County.

I hope also that you, Senator Byrd, will invite colored newsmen to cover your annual picnic on August 31st and that men of good will may by speech and action indicate their realization that all children of Virginia, white and colored, are our most valuable resource.

My family watched with the greatest admiration the TV program on Channel 5 this past Sunday night and were much impressed by Mr. Farmer of the Congress for Racial Equality. My son, Fred, who attends Davidson College in North Carolina, says he was the best speaker they ever had at the college. I feel sure your guests at the annual apple orchard picnic would gain a great deal from contact with a splendid leader like Mr. Farmer. As the marchers will be here on the 28th he no doubt will be in Washington and might consent to come to your picnic.

SUBJECT: ~~March~~ ^{Convocation in} Washington for Jobs and Freedom

Purpose: A ~~March~~ ^{Convocation in} Washington has been planned and organized by the major Civil Rights organizations of our country (N.A.A.C.P., CORE, S.C.L.C., S.N.C.C., N.A.L.C., N.U.L.)* scheduled for Wednesday, August 28, 1963. The purpose of the March is to arouse the conscience of America to the denial of Civil Rights to its Negro citizens and the economic plight of ~~the Negro~~ today.

To accomplish this purpose we plan to bring to Washington citizens from Congressional Districts in every State, hopefully 100,000, ^{minority groups} to ~~urge their Congressmen~~ ^{Individual citizens will present petitions to Congressmen regarding their} to vote favorably on the President's Civil Rights Bill as a bare minimum for Civil Rights legislation this year, and to call for the enactment of effective legislation to remedy the economic plight of ~~the Negro~~ in America.

The citizens of Washington Metropolitan area have a very important role to play in the implementation of the plans for the March. Therefore, the D.C. Coordinating Committee is calling upon citizens and organizations in the Washington Metropolitan area to volunteer their facilities and services in the following areas:

1. Facilities for assembling State delegations, meals and lodgings.
 - a. Churches desiring to offer their facilities as assembly points for State delegations are asked to register with the Committee by calling the Washington Urban League, Re 7-0367, and indicating the same to Mrs. Grace Pinkston.
 - b. While all ~~demonstrators~~ ^{petitioners} are being asked to arrive in Washington ^{convocation} early on the morning of the 28th and to leave at the close of the ~~demonstrations~~ on the evening of the 28th, we recognize that some facilities for lodging and meals will be necessary for ~~demonstrators~~ ^{petitioners} who travelled from great distances. For this reason we ask that those churches, organizations and individuals who are able to provide lodging and/or meals indicate this by calling the Urban League.
2. Participation of Washington area residents and organizations in the March.
 - a. All civic, religious, social, fraternal and neighborhood organizations wishing to go on record as officially supporting the March are asked to call the March office in the N.A.A.C.P. Building, Ad 2-2320, to apply for supportive status.
 - b. All individuals wishing to volunteer their services to the Coordinating Committee in carrying out the plans for the ~~March~~ ^{Convocation} are asked to call the March office, Ad 2-2320, and indicate same.

Plans call for the ~~demonstrators~~ ^{petitioners} to arrive at 51 assembly points in the Washington area (1 for each State and the District of Columbia) early on the morning of August 28. There the ~~demonstrators~~ will obtain final instructions for meeting with their ~~Congressmen~~ ^{petitioners} between the hours of 10 a.m. and 12 noon. At 2 p.m. the ~~marchers~~ ^{petitioners} will assemble on the South side of the White House, on the Elipse, and have a brief ~~demonstration~~ ^{petition} for jobs. From the Elipse the March will proceed down Constitution Avenue toward the Lincoln Memorial in solemn memory of slain Negro leader, Medgar Evers. From 3 to 5:30 p.m. a mass meeting will be held at the Lincoln Memorial.

The March is planned as a peaceful nonviolent demonstration in the best tradition of the First Amendment provisions of the Constitution for peaceful assembly to seek redress of grievances. Therefore, only those citizens who are committed to non-violence as a creative means of protest are urged to participate.

The Washington Urban League has been delegated the responsibility of organizing the Washington churches willing to offer their facilities to house the delegates to the March on Washington on August 28, 1963.

In order that the March be effective and dignified, there must be central locations where the delegates from each state can gather and be briefed. Our object is to organize the delegates so that there will be the least amount of confusion and the maximum amount of hospitality.

At least one church will be needed for each state. Mrs. Justine Harps is the Chairman of the March Committee on Housing for the Urban League. Some of the things she will need to know are:

1. Will your church be available?
2. Will you appoint a contact person for liason with the League?
3. Will you appoint a Hospitality Committee?

Dear Mr. Horsky:

Today's news about the Rights March (Sunday Star and Post) is astonishing.

The area where it is expected ^{that} 100,000 persons will be discharged from buses is without adequate comfort stations, food concessions, shade, water fountains or shelter of any kind. I recently took a group of girls to the Monument. The comfort facilities are quite inadequate for even a small party of tourists and we waited in line for our cooling drinks. I saw only one water fountain in the whole area.

Even with mobile Red Cross comfort stations I feel that this is an unbearable situation for persons who have come even a short distance of several hundred miles to be expected to sit or stand in the hot sun with no expectation of food, drink or lavatory facilities.

I assume you know that the Urban League sent out letters to every church in the District (form letter is enclosed with application form) and even with the help of the major churches in the city I recognize that the task of making comfortable this large a group is a tremendous undertaking. Rather, I think, all of the downtown hotels should be urged to make their facilities available. In addition to the churches we also need the facilities of the universities. If we could have George Washington, Georgetown, Howard University and American University we might be able to offer hospitality to our guests. This would seem to be a deliberate attempt (the plans proposed from New York) to discourage persons from coming to D. C.

Will you do what you can to insist that every person coming into town be made comfortable and offered over-night hospitality also, instead of hustling them out of town sharp at five or six in that inconsiderate manner.

May I also urge that all church bells (including the Taff Memorial bells and the Teamsper Union Building bells) be rung while the marchers go from the Monument to the Lincoln Memorial. Let us show all of these visitors that Washingtonians sympathize with and are grateful for their long, expensive and probably most uncomfortable trip here.

If this new plan for the March is ^{made} in order to put the burden of speaking to the visitors upon the members of Congress, I cannot see how they will be able to check who attends or does not, unless each seat is marked with the member's name and a careful check is made. Acceptance of an invitation would in no way be a valid check on whether or not the member of Congress attended. A speech at a church, however, would be an excellent way to learn which members are in fact sympathetic or unsympathetic with the civil rights legislation and each member could be invited to speak at some specific meeting place. Our big problem has always been getting the legislation to the Floor of the House and a roll-call vote taken. We need a speech made by the Member which can be quoted.

Dr. Lacy Sharp, of the American Hospital Association, called on August 8 to inquire what arrangements had been or could be made in case people would fall by the wayside and had to be taken to the hospital. He was thinking not only of the normal incidence of heat prostration (though he would want to know what first aid facilities might be available), but principally of the more serious illnesses, such as heart attacks, that would require more than just treatment and discharge, even in the hospital. Arrangements are made for District indigents, but he feared the hospitals would be overwhelmed with transient indigents.

Lee White's office referred me to John Douglas, and I got him on the second try and after hurdling the so-called secretarial barrier. He told me that there would be 16 first-aid units. People will not be dumped on the hospitals unless a doctor determines that the first aid facilities and dispensary attention are not adequate.

I asked him who in the District would be in charge of this phase of the matter, and he said Dr. Heath. So I called Dr. Sharp back and gave him the information Mr. Douglas had given me, and gave him Dr. Heath's name, telephone number, and position.

Dear Mr. Tobriner:

All of us who have the best interests of our nation's capital at heart commend the manner in which preparations have been conducted to handle the vast influx of Americans to this city on August 28 in connection with the expression of belief in fundamental civil rights. We in the International Association of Fire Fighters, affiliated with the AFL-CIO, have a warm regard for the position taken by President Kennedy in his many statements emphasizing the right of citizens to come to our capital and to express their views on matters of national or local importance, as a basic element of our traditional concern for free speech and free assembly.

We in the IAFF join with the responsible leaders of the community in our belief and hope that the August 28 meeting will be orderly and disciplined. We understand also that there must be responsible planning, in view of the expected size of the crowd, for every contingency relating to public order.

In many communities, under similar circumstances, there is a regrettable tendency on the part of municipal officials, to include the fire service directly in the master plans for an active role in the handling of crowds, the prevention of possible disorder, and the dispersal of persons if serious disorder occurs. In Washington, D. C., however, we in the International Association of Fire Fighters earnestly hope and urge you to include in your plans for August 28, a reliance on the fire services to perform their normal role as a "first line of defense" in protecting life and property against fire. We hope and urge, furthermore, that the responsible public officials make no decision to utilize members of the fire service as law enforcement officers.

Our position on this matter is based on the following facts, experiences and observations:

August 9, 1963

1. The saving of lives and the extinguishment of fires is a specialized skill, for which the members of the fire service have undergone long and arduous training. The enforcement of law and order is a different type of skill, and the members of the police forces have undergone long and specialized training to achieve their proficiency. The two skills and disciplines are not interchangeable.
2. Experience in many parts of the nation has demonstrated to the International Association of Fire Fighters that the display of deployed firefighting equipment, in situations where civil disorder is anticipated, has an inciting rather than a calming effect on the crowd.
3. There is obviously no shortage of law enforcement personnel in this area, when one considers the size of the various police forces, the other law enforcement bodies, and the military. The argument that fire service personnel and equipment must be "drafted", which has been used in some other communities in times of stress, is obviously not relevant here.
4. The use of fire fighting personnel and equipment against crowds in the nation's capital might well do damage to America's democratic posture in the eyes of people at home and abroad.

For all these reasons, then, we earnestly hope and request that you and your fellow officials will use fire fighting personnel and equipment on August 28 only for their normal duties and responsibilities: the fighting of fires, the saving of life and property - duties for which the fire fighters have skill, training and experience.

The members of our organization, Mr. Commissioner, have given deep thought over a long period of time to this problem. Our views were not lightly adopted, but were developed through democratic discussion and debate in our local unions and at our national conventions. The position which I have expressed here is based upon the philosophy of an important resolution adopted by our union at its convention in Buffalo, N.Y., in 1960. I attach a copy of the text of that resolution, and I believe that from it you can see the seriousness and sincerity with which our people have addressed themselves to this problem.

August 29-September 3, 1960

adopted the following resolution:

RE: Protesting the Use of the Fire Service as a Law Enforcement Agency

WHEREAS, The fire service is recognized as a first line of defense in the event of an invasion, floods or other destructive elements, aid to injured and other performances beyond the call of fire fighting, and

WHEREAS, This ambidexterity of the fire service has in the past led to the misuse of fire fighters and their equipment, particularly in the line of police work, and

WHEREAS, Many members of the IAFF have been ordered to direct hose streams upon gatherings and in some instances they were given clubs to do the work which should be the duty of police officers or other law enforcement agencies, and,

WHEREAS, The practice of using fire fighters and their equipment for this purpose has been given wide publicity in the press, on radio and TV throughout the nation and could become the common weapon of indiscriminate powers to break up picket lines of striking unions, all of which is detrimental to the IAFF policy of maintaining separate fire and police departments, and

WHEREAS, The fire fighters court of last resort is usually the public which we serve, and many who have expressed themselves are opposed to fire fighters being made to serve in the role of law enforcement agents, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the IAFF assembled in Convention at Buffalo, N. Y., go on record as protesting the use of its members and fire fighting equipment to disperse gatherings and for any other duties relegated to police or other law enforcement agencies, and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Executive Officers of the IAFF give this matter their immediate attention, striving for a solution which will convey to all concerned, the fire fighters' side of this issue and, when an incident occurs where fire fighters and/or equipment are used as law enforcement agents, the district Vice President after he is duly notified by the local union concerned shall be dispatched to that location and contact all responsible persons, make an investigation and send a report to the IAFF office, causing same report to be published in "The International Fire Fighter", official publication.
